STUDENTS	Save money on college tuition.  Decrease student loan debt.  The program offers up to 21 courses/63 credits.  All credits can be transferred to HBCUs, Ivy Leagues and participating collegiate institutions.  Close observation by HBCUs, Ivy Leagues, participating collegiate institutions and other sponsors.  Scholarship bids > IN/OUT-SOURCE (explained later).  Better job opportunities after high school graduation for having courses completed (fast track to associate degree).  Internship opportunities  Starting an internship early gives students more experience at the end of college graduation.  Imagine graduating at the age of 20 and already having 4 years of experience?!!  Paid Peer tutoring for current high school classes. TEACHERS	<ul> <li>Gain teaching experience opportunities with just a Bachelors.</li> <li>Multiple teachers can teach one course.</li> <li>Break course down &gt; one teacher per week, unless one teacher bids on all 10 weeks for a course.</li> <li>Allows students to interact with multiple styles.</li> <li>Upload lesson recordings.</li> <li>Teachers can upload pre-recorded/edited videos for their lessons.</li> <li>Must be seen and clearly heard in the videos.</li> <li>Students can insert a question (recording or text) in the recording.</li> <li>Question and response will post under the recording as public.</li> <li>Teachers can ask a question during the recordings.</li> <li>Students must provide a response that's posted under the recording as public.</li> <li>These can be graded.</li> <li>Responses can't be seen by other students until 2 days after. This stops from repeating answers from other students and not thinking for self.</li> <li>Quiz after each recording.</li> <li>These can be graded.</li> </ul>
INSTITUTIONS	Affirmative Action isn't a factor. Non-bias student search filters. Non-bias learning. Institutions can log into their portal and use filters to get a list of desired students. Students are listed as an alpha-numeric pattern to remove bias. Ability to send messages to the student about future opportunities and/or internships. Institutions can use our academic system to place scholarship bids on current students enrolled in the program while checking their status in the program. There are two different kinds of scholarships: InSOURCE > Scholarships are given to the program to help pay tuition for that student. OUT-SOURCE > Scholarships handled by the awarding-institution, usually given to seniors. Increase enrollment without financial burden of constructing more dorms and classrooms on already-establish campuses. Great way of showing students the institutions care more about them receiving an education than making money of their need for an education in order to obtain a career/employment.

# CREDIT TRANSFERS

- To ensure that our credits are transferable to any institution, we use the following method in addition to transfer agreements:
  - · A syllabus is created by working with every participating collegiate institution.
    - Each institution must submit their approved syllabus for a particular course.
    - Our team combines all into one, nationally approved syllabus.
    - This will be the syllabus we use to teach enrolled high school students.
      - Could also be used to teach current college students.
  - A global course number will be agreed upon by all participating HBCUs, Ivy Leagues and participating collegiate institutions.
    - For example:
      - ASU > ACT 214 Fund of Fin Accounting I
      - Howard U  $\rightarrow$  ACCT 201 Accounting Principles I
      - YALE > ACCT 270, Foundations of Accounting and Valuation
      - National Course Number > ACCT2-01 Foundations of Accounting Principles I
  - Each course equates to the same number of credits at the institution.






